Smooth Seas Don't Produce Skillful Sailors

One of my favorite sayings is, "Don't look back you're not going that way." In other words, focus on what is ahead and free yourself from the past, don't even look back. If we are to live from glory to glory in the ever expanding and increasing Kingdom of Heaven here on earth, we cannot afford to be fixated on the past allowing it to define how we will be in the future.
